NI Governance Update

The Future of Northern Intermountain with an Eye on Governance

Our partnership with the National office of PSIA-AASI and affiliation with other divisions has increased our awareness and unity of the three C's: Communication, Collaboration, and Consolidation. This helps to guide us to work together in order to achieve success with the leadership of our Executive Director and Committees, as well as our Operations Team. She has provided much insight as to how we as a board should provide leadership to accomplish our own set of the three C's as a means to lead. The purpose of the initiative is to align our governance documents with how we are currently operating and prepare us for the future. Ensuring well-written governance documents creates the Board's connection with our organization's ultimate potential and helps us operate more efficiently and effectively. The end result will be to enable sound decision making practices to our members with the future in mind. We hope to bring the revised bylaws and policies and procedures in front of the general membership as early as the first quarter of 2019.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and Operations Staff, we look forward to your support of this initiative and thank you for all your work and commitment to making this a great division.

Pathway to NI Children's Specialist Trainer (CST) CDCT and CDCL REVISED

Announcement & Application:

The pathway for Children's Divisional Clinician Trainee (CDCT) and Children's Divisional Clinician Leader (CDCL) will be posted on the NI website, and links to the pathway will, from time to time, be in the newsletter. To gather information and make inquiries, contact the NI Executive Staff and Children's Chair. Contact information can be found on NI website: www.psia-ni.org

Requirements to qualify:

- Current member of PSIA-AASI, in good standing
- Current Discipline Certification Level 3
- Current CS2
- Current Discipline DCT/DCL status

Pathway to CDCT & from CDCT to CDCL:

Eligible candidates are encouraged to contact the NI Children's Chair. An on snow interview with the current children's divisional staff will be scheduled. Successful candidates will be invited to become CDCTs, and will shadow CS clinics and exams for one to two years, or longer, if needed. The CDCT may be asked to participate by leading a part of a prep clinic.

Required* number of clinics to shadow is (* number may be adjusted by Chair, on case by case basis):

1 CS1 Prep Clinic

1 CS2 Prep Clinic

1 CS1 Assessment

1 CS2 Exam

After the shadowing requirement has been met, the CDCT may become a CDCL.

CDCTs and CDCLs will be expected to attend fall and spring NI Ed Staff Training and fill out all paperwork needed to assume these roles.

The NI Children's Chair will oversee the entire process.

Scholarship Opportunities

The Northern Intermountain division is excited to be offering various scholarships through the PSIA/AASI-NI Education Foundation. Any PSIA/AASI-NI member in good standing (both membership and continuing education) is eligible to apply. NI Awards: Nomination/Selection Process and Eligibility Criteria:

Help recognize those NI members who have had a positive impact on you, your school, our organization and snowsports as an industry! If you know someone with infectious enthusiasm for instructing, a giving individual who has committed hours to an extensive NI project, and is a role model with a long-time history with the association, then take a moment to nominate them to receive an award.

Nominations must be submitted in writing (email or print) to the Division Secretary. Any member of PSIA-AASI-NI, in good standing, may make nominations. Include any and all information, plus contact information, should there be any clarification or further elaboration necessary. Deadline for nominations will be March 15. The Division Secretary reviews the nominations, conducts necessary research, and submits the nominations to the Board for approval. NI Division Awards:

<u>Criteria</u>: A member who has made an exceptional contribution to PSIA-AASI-NI as a teacher, coach or leader and has been an extraordinary role model as a professional.

Rookie of the Season

Eligibility: Any active member in their first year as a snowsports instructor.

<u>Criteria</u>: A member who has made an exceptional contribution and impression in their first season with PSIA-AASI-NI as a teacher, coach or leader. This award goes to someone who has demonstrated superior ability, aptitude and inspiration to snowsports education in their first season as an instructor. It's a great way to recognize a rising superstar. <u>Award</u>: Plaque, Membership Dues (Divisional) for 1 year.

Northern Intermountain Hall of Fame: Lex Kunau Legends Award

<u>Eligibility</u>: Any member of PSIA-AASI-NI - active, or alumni, with more than 25 years in the Association. The award may be given posthumously.

<u>Criteria</u>: This award recognizes those senior members in good standing who give a life long commitment to the development and/or history of snowsports including instructing, service on the board of directors, writing technical or feature articles for publications, etc.

Award: Plaque.

CONGRATULATIONS! 2017-18 PSIA/AASI Angus Graham Rising Star Award Recipient: Christian Luening



It all started in the spring of 1983, in Squaw Valley, CA. "I believe I was around 18 months—yes, I've always been big. The next season, I was sliding on my own, at Squaw again. We moved to southern Germany and I did some 'ski racing' in Austria, until I was around 6. When we moved back to Houston, TX, we spent most vacations, like good Texans, at Beaver Creek, CO. I loved going back, year after year to ski with the same instructors and groups of kids...Fast forward to July 2012, when my wife and I moved to Boise and I started working at the Bogus Basin Ski

and Snowboard School that first winter."

When Christian and his wife were looking to relocate from Gainesville, FL, Boise was on their short list of possibilities. "Looking for a town that had mountains with skiing and outdoor living in close proximity, a solid rugby club, and a town with a population that wasn't too big or too small," Boise won the coin toss. Feeling the Sensations in the Bottom of the Feet

"Skiing is done with the feet and ankles. The rest of the body is supportive." —Harold Harb. I have taught and studied skiing for a while now. I have come to the conclusion that TOUCH and FEEL in the feet is one of the most important aspects a person can have to become a proficient skier. Feeling in the bottom and/or sides of the feet directly relates to the ability to balance our center of mass over, or in line with our base of support. Tuning into where we feel pressure in our feet through different phases of the turn is a critical component of balancing over or in-line with the ski. Let's relate the feelings/sensations in the feet to the five fundamental movements we have in skiing.

1.) Control the regulation of the C of M to the base of support to direct pressure along the length of the ski.

How do we know if we are further forward or backward from center? By feeling where we are heaviest in the bottom of the feet. If we are forward, we are going to feel more pressure on the front part of the feet or balls of the feet. If we are back we are going to feel more pressure on the back portion of the feet or the back of the arch, just ahead of the heel.


2.) Control pressure from ski to ski and direct pressure toward the outside ski.

How do we know which ski has more pressure? If we are in transition and balanced, equally pressuring both skis, we are going to feel pressure in the bottom of both feet equally for a brief instant. As we direct pres-

sure towards the outside ski we will feel more pressure in the bottom and side of the outside foot through the turn. As our balance migrates from the downhill ski through neutral to the new downhill ski the pressure sensations in the bottom of the feet migrate across as well.


3.) Control edge angles through a combination of inclination and angulation.


How do we create edging movements? By moving laterally to balance against the forces that act on the skis when they are tipped onto edge. Inclination and angulation are terms that are commonly used to describe body movements relative to edge control. We can feel this in our feet by feeling the outside of one foot and the inside of the other.



5.) Regulate the magnitude of pressure through ski snow interaction.

How do we regulate the magnitude of pressure? You guessed it! Through sensations in the bottom of the feet. We flex and extend to regulate the pressure to the bottom of the feet. We feel more pressure in the bottom of the feet as we extend and less as we flex. As the ski bends with the interaction of the snow and terrain feel sensations migrate through the feet from the toes to the back of the arch. For example, skiing a series of rollers we feel a heavy sensation in the feet as we extend in the bottom and a light sensation in the feet as we flex at the top of the roller. A balanced skier can flex or extend freely to maintain ski snow contact.







While blending of turning and tipping is the ideal, this Quick Tip is focused on tipping the feet to acquire the edges. A simple exercise line may be used to achieve the desired outcome without much overthinking. Start with a good athletic stance in a straight run on very mellow terrain, no poles to start with. Place a couple of fingers of the inside hand on the outside half of the inside quad. For example: if a right turn is in progress place the right fingers at the right front of the right quad. Bend the inside knee and flex the quad muscles to press fingers toward the inside ski tip. If pressure is directed laterally ski divergence will occur – NO SIDEWAYS PRESSURE! Take a little peek down

and notice both skis are on the uphill edges. Done properly the inside ankle will bend and tip toward the little toe edge (a diagonal move.) A side benefit of tipping the inside ski in this manor is the outside foot and ankle will magically mimic the move and tip on to the big toe edge. Try a few in each direction. As the feeling of tipping becomes more natural place the inside hand into skiing position (even use poles if desired) but imagine pressing the inside hand toward the inside ski tip. At this point it is just a matter of practice on progressively more challenging terrain. Enjoy the carve and look for those knife edge track.

Remembering Mike Hughes

Our "Magic Mike," the Lion of the Mountain, passed away on June 20, 2018.

Mike Hughes was born on Aug. 20, 1928, in New Britain, Conn., to parents Raymond Hughes and Julia Jones Hughes. From an early age, Mike paved his own way and became a lifelong ski instructor. Over his 70-year career he taught thousands of skiers—from Stowe, Vt., to Portillo, Chile, and finally to his beloved Sun Valley, which he called his permanent home. In 2018, he received a plaque from the Sun Valley Ski School commemorating 50 years of service.

In his early years, he was nicknamed "Iron Mike" for his spectacular waterskiing abilities. At one time, he made a record distance jump of 138 feet! On Sun Valley's Bald Mountain, his name transitioned from "Iron Mike" to "Magic Mike," as he took

countless skiers, at every level, and transformed their abilities. What he instilled in thousands of students was often almost miraculous, hence the name, "Magic Mike." Mike's humor, storytelling and his ability to bring excitement to every experience is what set him apart. Mike loved what he did, did what he loved, and never worked a day in his life. He skied not for money or glory but to impart his uncanny insight for improving technique and his skill for teaching the sport he so dearly loved. He also will be fondly remembered at Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church, as the spectacular Irish tenor that always sat in the front row.

Stowe, Vt., in the early '60s, with skiing "greats" Penny Pitou and Betsy Snite, stating that Mike's enthusiasm and style could certainly be called "flamboyant." Mary later visited Mike in Sun Valley as their circle of skiing buddies also included local skiing icon Nonie Foley.


