The Future of Northern Intermountain Division

You may be asking yourself this question now and perhaps in the future. Even with all that is happening in our nation and world, we often focus on what's in our backyard and our lives specifically. The Operational Leaders of PSIA/AASI (Executive Directors and CEO's of each Division and National) have been meeting weekly since the COVID-19 pandemic struck, when resorts and schools across the country shut down. With that in mind, Northern Intermountain Division had a very successful season with events, including clinics, exams and accreditations. A few exams and Symposium were canceled with the COVID-19 shutdown and some members were directly affected. We received strong support from Member School Management in providing events and are working with them to develop a calendar for next season. Our goal is to have a majority of events in the new membership database system and online by September, so you can plan your season well in advance.

Membership renewal is in full swing and the numbers are in alignment with other Divisions. A couple new things for this season that may help with dues payments: 1) the deadline has been extended to October 1st, before any late fees will be applied, and 2) we are beginning quarterly billing to help spread payments over the course of the year. We plan to send your CEU update in September, indicating the number of CEU's you have or need to take to fulfill requirements to maintain your credentials.

Speaking of CEU's, since Symposium at Tamarack was cancelled, Wolfe Ashcraft and Jake Bolin are working with Weylin Barrett on developing a "Summer Symposium" event, (Jake promises to develop a more "creative" title), mid to late July. They are working with Tamarack catering and group services to provide a meeting and meal space. We are hoping to offer mountain biking and paddle boarding relating to skiing and riding, and indoor Ed events for those who may not want to do the riding and paddling. We are looking at hosting our annual member meeting and awards since we were unable do that in April. This will be promoted as a family event and housing is also being secured. As the planning and dates are secured, all of this is dependent on how the State progresses through and to the third phase of re-opening.

Many of you participated in the Member Survey that came out about the time of shutdown, and we appreciate you taking the time to complete the survey. Of significance, is our Net Promoter Score (NPS) jumped from 28 last season to 50 this season. The National Average was 41, up from 38. The only other Division with an NPS of 50 was the Western Division. The past 3 years we were in the neighborhood of 35-28. Members were generally happy and satisfied with what we are doing, especially for exams and accreditations and the preparation for those events, but there are areas we can improve: ease of registration, which will improve this next season; better communication to members and member schools; and better social media. We are working with member schools and resorts as they develop plans to address COVID-19 and this next season. Please refer to the website PSIA-NI.org and look for eblasts and newsletter updates. Also, with the re-organizing of the Board of Directors, we are in a very strategic position for our future. We need your support so we may support you better in our future.

News from the National Children's Task Force

Each fall PSIA-AASI hosts Fall Conference in Colorado. It's a time for the National Team, National Board of Directors, Division Presidents and Division Discipline Chairs to get together to discuss, plan and implement for the upcoming winter season. Currently the new National Standards are being worked on.

The National Standards have been a work in progress for five years for the Kids Team. The Alpine Team led the way and the other disciplines are now working for alignment with them. It has not been an easy process.

The NCTF works mostly year-round via conference calls and with the abrupt end to our ski season, we are back at it. To say we have been bogged down in the past is an understatement. This spring we decided to divide into three groups to focus on the three skill groups of the Learning Connection:



People, Technical, and Teaching. Working in smaller groups is a much easier process than trying to get 20 or so people to agree on how to say something. Progress is being made! Conference calls are twice a month for each group and once a month for the whole NCTF. The Learning Outcomes, Assessment Activities, Assessment Criteria and Performance Goals we are working on will become the new National Standard for Children's Specialist 1 and 2. We will be aligned with the other disciplines and it's going to be incredible when we are finally finished. Look for the new National Standards to be out in the next year or two.

Kids Warm Our Hearts

At Pomerelle Ski School, teaching kids skiing and snowboarding is our mainstay. During my five years of teaching at "Pomy," most of the rewards come from the mouths of kids. My average class size is 6-10 kids per class, one time per week for 4-6 weeks. Every once in a while, one kid really stands out, not by how they learn, but what comes out of their mouth!

I recall one from my Sunday class (8 kids, Twin Falls Rec). I was washing my hands after lunch in the restroom, and I hear, "Do you go to a gym?" I look around and do not see anyone and wonder who is the voice? **Louder!** "**Do you go to a gym**?" I look around the partition, "Oh, Hi Jack...well yes, I do." Jack (7 years old) says, "Isn't that cool! Your name's **Jim**, and you go to a **gym**." I just smiled and laughed all afternoon.

The following year, I have Jack again, now 8, present in my Sunday class. Jack is riding with me on the chair. It's a *Pomerelle snowing, cold, windy day*. "Jim, I am so glad I'm in your class again this year!" I'm thinking this is kinda cool! A few minutes pass, then the jokes start rolling out! I about fell out of the chair laughing and thinking to myself, this kid is only 8.

This last season, it was Sunday morning 'National Learn to Ski Free Day' and the *never-nevers* were growing in numbers walking up to the Magic Carpet. I'm wondering what types of athleticism our Ski School Director will bestow on me this morning. Then, I hear a voice, "Hi Jim! Hi Jim!" Well, I knew it was one of two moms from last year. She says "I'm Sharee, Jack's mom and here is Hudson, Jack's little brother." That saved my memory! Then she asked, "Are you teaching Twin Falls Rec this year?" I said loudly, "I'm not sure." She says, "I hope so, then I know my boys will be safe." I smile and turn my head to our Ski School Director. "Barry?" He looks disgruntled, "Yeah, take 'em." I smile big time!

In a few minutes I have a class of seven kids (7-10 years old). Sharee asks if I will take Hudson (7) on the chair with me as he is quite small. So, the first ride up our Easy Rider chair, Hudson remarks, "Jim, this is so cool, I've been hearing Jack talking for two years about riding the chair with you and this year it's **me**!" as his little thumbs go flying in the air! A couple of weeks later, I am explaining to Hudson (on the chair) that I will be in Mexico for one of their Sundays and I mentioned my passport. Hudson



says, "I have a passport. We travel a lot." I ask him where? "Idaho Falls, Boise, and Sun Valley." I try to hold my expression. Well the next week, brother Jack needs back in the spotlight, "Jim, I have a joke." I kneeled beside him knock-know - who's there -Ida - ida who - "no Jim, it's pronounced Idaho!" I then fall over in the snow laughing!

At the end of this season, Sharee asks if my wife and I would like to come to a baseball game and watch the boys playing this summer. This is one of the **key blessings** of why I teach skiing!

PSIA Northern Intermountain Alpine Certification Update

I hope that everyone has been managing okay during these strange and challenging times. The abrupt end to the season was definitely a roller coaster ride as many of us were ramping up for certification events, end-of-season education and celebration and the joy of spring skiing and riding. Our Northern Intermountain Alpine Certification committee has been having a productive spring and we have been able to take advantage of the quarantine time to move forward with some projects for the 2020-21 season and beyond.

NI Alpine Certification Committee: Because of our small size, Northern Intermountain does not have a standing committee structure like many of the other PSIA-AASI Divisions. These committees play an important role in planning and implementing changes to education and certification projects. In my role as Alpine Certification Chairperson, I have begun to reach out to our education leaders and create opportunities for an ad hoc alpine certification committee where anyone on our staff who would like to contribute their time and expertise has the opportunity to do so. During the winter we had some very valuable contributions to our Certification Guide from Amy Post, Christian Luening and Taylor Caballero. This spring, Loren Livermore, John Straka and Weylin Barrett were also able to contribute to work that was done. Loren Livermore has also been working on developing more robust training resources for our member schools. I would like to thank them for their hard work and I look forward to what is coming next.

Upcoming National Standards: The PSIA-AASI National Board will be voting on a new set of Alpine Certification Standards this June. The new standards are part of aligning our PSIA-AASI education and certification practices with the Learning Connection Model (LCM) and to make our practices clearer and more consistent across the nation. The proposed plan is for the standards to take effect for the 2021-22 season. This plan was developed prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and may be changed; I expect this to be clearer following the June board meetings. Much of the work we've been doing this spring has been in beginning to analyze our processes and plan for how we will be shifting to meet the requirements of these new standards. Our primary objective is not to create circumstances where things need to be unlearned as we progress. I am confident that we will be able to evolve our processes forward in a way that is not disruptive or that creates undue challenges to those who are currently in the process of training and working on certification goals.

2020-21 NI Alpine Certification Processes: Our plan for the 2020-21 season is for our PSIA-NI alpine certification processes to remain very similar to what they have been over the past several seasons. The Level 1 process will continue as a one-day assessment and the Level 2 and 3 processes will continue to be held as single day modules with a skiing module and a teaching/technical module. We do anticipate changes to our scorecards to be better aligned with the updated standards and the LCM model and that there will be adjustments to some of the tasks and assignments. Overall, these changes should be fairly simple. After the June board meetings, the Alpine Certification group will begin work to make these updates and have a revised certification guide published in the fall.

Women's Summit-A PSIA/AASI Experience Unlike Any Other

I would happily admit that I love PSIA clinics. I mean yes, to maintain our membership we must take 6 credits a year, but why would you stop at 6? After almost every clinic or exam I catch myself saying, "Wow! That was the best clinic I've ever been to!" Is it just my excitement to learn something new, or hearing a fresh perspective on something that I have been working on? This winter I had the opportunity to attend the Women's Summit at Snowbird. It was an event that was unlike anything else I have been a part as a member of PSIA. I will say for sure it was the best experience on snow that I have ever had! We had three full days of on- and off-snow learning and the whole event was full of inspiration that left me with a new level of confidence in both my skiing and teaching abilities.

One of the most amazing parts of this summit was that it was not just ski instructors. There were many National Ski Patrol members, as well as women leaders in the industry. There was a feeling that we are all one community, and by working together, we could achieve more. There is a reasonable question: Why only women? Is this not the opposite of inclusivity that PSIA/ AASI promotes? The answer could be yes, but when you look at the statistics of women in Snowsports, and percentages of women that are in management roles in our industry, and the percentage of women that have advanced certification in our organization it seems less exclusive, and more about giving women a chance to make up some of these differences.

All the on-snow clinics were led by education staff members from various divisions. When signing up, I was able choose from several different tracks for the event. I chose the certification track. Other choices were try-out track, leadership track, and ski/ride improvement track. We were put into groups and assigned a clinician. We got to ski with this group each day until lunch. In the afternoon you could choose from a wide variety of topics, all the way from cruising the groomers to fast and fun. Or you could choose to stay for indoor discussions. Each afternoon once the lifts closed the learning and discussions did not end, we would have indoor discussions, and then Après ski and networking.


I have this fear in the back of my mind every time that I join a clinic, especially with people that I do not know. I am going to be the worst skier and hold everyone back. Almost immediately after clicking into my bindings on the first day this angst was relieved. It did not



matter who was the best skier. Everyone in my group was so supportive, and still managed to push me past my comfort level. One of the highlights of my whole trip was because of this push. On the last day in the afternoon, I chose to go with a group to ski off-piste. There were so many of us that we had to be split up. I put myself in the lower group and almost got away with it, when I heard, "Colleen you don't belong with them, you are coming with us." It was from the clinic leader that I had skied with the day before, and she was leading the advanced group. We ended up skiing the afternoon on the steepest terrain I have ever skied! When we got to the bottom of the run it was all cheering and compliments. My fear of holding others back never even crossed my mind.

When asked what was the most valuable thing that I got from the Women's Summit, it is hard to answer, but on reflection I


